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Friends in Christ,

One of the most enjoyable parts of my job happens when I get to dream with people about the future of St. Mark's. This past winter, the Vestry and I did some dreaming about the four pillars of our shared life—children's formation, adult formation, service/outreach and beautiful worship. More recently, I've been dreaming with the Stewardship Committee about what we would like to accomplish next year and for what we are raising funds.

Both of these dreaming sessions shared something: unbridled enthusiasm for our future. There is nothing that the people of St. Mark's cannot accomplish for the kingdom of God in the world. Our members are in the streets advocating for justice in our city, they are giving aid and succor to those in need, they are wrestling with the great questions of life and faith. That should cause no fear whatsoever. Christians have been funding mission work in the world since the very first Christians came into existence. Money is easy. Passion and vision are hard. And we have passion and vision in abundance, thanks be to God. God will resource God's vision. It has always been that way in the church, and St. Mark's will be no different.

So, dream with me. Think about what is possible. Pray over this community of faith. And listen to where God is leading us. There are people in this city who will want to partner with us in our vision, who will want to share our passion. And I've been seeing some of their faces already on Sunday mornings. We are in a good position to answer God's call, and I could not be more excited to do more dreaming with all of you.



## Outreach Spotlight: Milwaukee Guest House Helps the Homeless

**O**n any given night in Milwaukee, 1,400 people are homeless—men, women and children.

This number is depressing, even shameful. Isaiah tells us, “Share your food with the hungry; and give shelter to the homeless.” (*Isaiah 58:7*) How do we do that here, in Milwaukee, in 2016?

One nonprofit group, the Guest House of Milwaukee, has a unique approach to ending homelessness. The Guest House helps people move off the streets and into safe housing. The next step is more challenging. The Guest House strives to provide people with the tools and services they need to stay in their new housing permanently and to transform their lives.

The mission of the Guest House starts at 13th and Highland. Up to 86 homeless men live there in the emergency shelter. The Guest House has case managers to work with each person individually. The Guest House runs a substance abuse and mental health clinic on site so guests can readily access treatment.

Beyond the walls at 13th and Highland, the work of the Guest House expands to include women, children and families. Guest House case managers support about 400 families and individuals living in apartments throughout the city.

The Guest House serves about 1,000 people yearly. In order to do this, the number of case managers has grown to around 20. The annual budget has doubled over the last ten years to around \$4 million. Just last month, the Guest House opened an 8,000 square foot addition to its main building, providing more space for case managers, treatment, programming, a larger dining area, and a new commercial kitchen. The ultimate goal of the work at Guest House is to help each person find permanent housing and permanent employment.

We at St. Mark’s are supporting the work of the Guest House right now. In your name, St. Mark’s has donated money to the Guest House for over ten years, most recently with gifts of \$1,000 annually. The money comes from the special fundraising we do together as a church—the Flower Sale, the Corn Roast and the Pumpkin Sale. Providing shelter for people in need is a key element of St. Mark’s Outreach Ministry.

The Advent series will be:


- December 1—The life of Benedict
