

## A Greeting from Fr. Burch

Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Greetings from Chicago! I am elated to begin our ministry together January 1, 2016. Travis and I are doing a great deal of preparation—logistical and emotional—to wind down our lives in Chicago and to begin our lives in Milwaukee. We already are making lists of the restaurants we want to try and getting our bikes tuned up for the Oak Leaf Trail. Other suggestions welcome.

Several years ago, while I discerned the move from hospital ministry to parish ministry, one of my colleagues asked me a question that had never occurred to me. He said, “What is your perfect church?” After some thought, I replied by saying I wanted to serve a small, liturgical, progressive, justice-oriented congregation on the ocean that wanted to grow. Four out of five ain’t bad. Plus, I think Lake Michigan counts as an inland sea.

Of course I know that no church is perfect as I know that no Rector is perfect. I tell my story only to highlight that I have been thinking and praying about you even before I knew about a church called St. Mark’s. In July, Travis and I combed through the paperwork of parishes looking for Rectors, and I read many, many profiles. In a national search, yours stood out to me. I saw a parish that both over performs (in terms of community impact and care for each other and the poor) and under performs (in terms of membership and neighborhood footprint)—which I think is a strong position in which to be. I saw a parish poised for growth. I saw a



parish full of the love and mercy of God. And I saw a parish wherein Travis and I could make a home.

In the interview process, I had the chance to meet many of you. You cared for Travis and for me when we were strangers in your city. Your kindness, faithfulness, warmth and intelligence shone through the entire process. I knew that I wanted to do ministry with you, and I had a strong sense that my gifts and your needs would be complementary.

And so, I am coming to listen and learn with you. I want to know about St. Mark’s—your people, your stories, your ministries. I want to know where you are feeling called by the Spirit in the city of Milwaukee. I want to partner with you as we live out Jesus’ Great Commission. And I want to break bread and share wine with you in January when we arrive.



Thank you to all the volunteers who helped with the sale. We had a bumper crop of good pumpkins and a bumper crop of great volunteers!






# Sunday Exploration

## Coffee Hour



Celebrate Christ's nativity and the wonder of the holy night of his birth. This service will include carols, selections by the St. Mark's Choir, and a candlelight procession.


### **Christmas Lessons & Carols with Holy Eucharist**—Sunday, Dec. 27, at 9:30 a.m.

## Common Ground at St. Mark's

In October, we conducted our Friends of Common Ground (FOCG) campaign in the parish. This campaign's purpose is to fund Common Ground's operating expenses. While every member organization of CG pays annual dues of 1% of the pledged income from the previous year, that collected sum is not enough to totally fund ongoing programs and staff.

Common Ground accepts no government funding and guards its independent status by relying entirely on private sources with no strings attached. In order to do this, CG has to have an annual fund drive, in addition to funding from private foundations and local and national church sources.

This year's goal for the FOCG is \$100,000. St. Mark's set a goal of raising at least \$6,000 for this purpose. The campaign in the parish was carried out by the CG Core Team members, who lead our efforts on all the issues that are now being undertaken.

The Core Team's efforts have resulted in over \$7,000 being raised to date, with more contributions still coming in. We want to thank all the parishioners who contributed to FOCG for 2016. Your generosity will help CG continue its work of seeking the common good of the Milwaukee Community through its various issue campaigns.

As a parish, we are one of the top five of nearly 50 member organizations in the amount of money raised. The Core Team worked very hard, and all of you were very generous.
