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## Deacon's Corner

I have the sense that everybody is getting a little anxious over who our new rector is going to be. We are also wondering, "When will we know? When are they coming?" This is very natural since the people in every institution I know like to have a captain at the helm.

Depending on our particular passions, we are hoping that the new rector will be a whiz at stewardship, committed to children and adult formation, have a passion for pastoral work, and grew their last parish by 200 members in their first five years. And don't forget, they will be also very successful in developing lay leadership, while being a strong leader themselves. In short they will be **SUPER PASTOR!**

Yes, we all have high expectations for our new rector as leader of the parish. To not have a wish list of gifts that we would like our new rector to bring to us just runs contrary to human nature. But I would like to suggest a new way to anticipate the arrival of a new priest.

Let's turn our eyes on ourselves more than on our next leader. Let's dig deep in ourselves and ask the question, "What kind of gifts can I offer to the parish, and the new rector, that will help guide them in their first year with us?"

Let's not sit passively and wait for something "new" to happen. Rather be ready to begin a partnership with our priest. Decide how and where your gifts



of ministry can best help our rector and the parish. Don't be stingy with your talents and time. Help our new priest develop a sense of who we are and what we want to be in the future.

Remember you may have more years of management experience than our new leader. You may have been on the front lines of Christian formation for two or three decades. You very well could have more years of fundraising under your belt than whatever preparation was given in seminary.

So don't be shy in offering up your dreams for our parish as well as your gifts. Your generosity will be very important in our new priest's beginning years here. Now is the time to act. Discern where you can be a light and a support.

The ball is really in our court as we welcome new leadership into our parish. Your gifts are precious. Commit them today.

## Further Thoughts on Intercessory Prayer



*“Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with sighs too deep for words.”*

*Romans 8:26*

Recently I needed to use a hospital Emergency Services Unit (usually referred to as the ER) twice in one week. If you’ve been a patient in the ER, you know it’s a wonderful place to be when you need those services; but it’s not the place for all medical services, and you usually go home wondering why they couldn’t do things a little faster. My visit included waiting time before being taken to a room for care and waiting time between getting the necessary tests and CT scan done and receiving the results. I was sick and apprehensive about what might happen to me.

What I saw happening around me on both occasions is that some patients who go to the ER use it instead of using the services of a primary care physician. Some patients check in and leave before their care is complete, or have issues with waiting for prescription medications to arrive or going through the necessary diagnostic tests. This all took place while many patients arrived by ambulance or by car.

The ER staff members were kind, respectful, good at their jobs, and provided everyone with all the information they needed. Their treatment of those who complained, left against medical advice, or refused care was just as good as my treatment was.

Because I was worried, of course I prayed for God to be present whatever might happen to me. My husband’s prayers for me were already assured. While I waited, I considered turning on the TV but quickly rejected that as a waste of time and brain power. It occurred to me, I’m sure because God put it in my mind, that I could use intercessory prayer on behalf of all the ER patients I’d seen or overheard. (“Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with sighs too deep for words.” Romans 8:26) Knowing what to pray wasn’t difficult because God already knew the needs of all those people. I just held up each one and asked God for all things to work together for good in their lives. (Romans 8:28, paraphrased)

By the time my ER doctor arrived with the results of the lab work and CT scan, I had stopped fretting about how long I had to wait. I felt I had accomplished something useful for the other patients. Intercessory prayer is never without effect for those for whom we pray, and it has good effects on the ones who do it as well.


# Men’s Retreat

June 5–7


