Time has also flown by when we look at ourselves here at St. Mark's and realize that April departed way back in mid-July. I am happy to report that all of our programs here at St. Mark's have continued and we have even added programs to our schedule for example: Theology Pub and our youth Sunday Exploration Group. Please mark your calendars for June 14. Our Sunday Exploration Group will be taking part in serving in our Sunday service; they will be providing all of our lay ministry duties. After much work and prayer, the effort will move to the Vestry. This month will



begin the Vestry's interview process. Once this is done, the Vestry will vote for a candidate. Then negotiations begin with a Letter of Agreement. The Letter of Agreement is our contract with the new Rector. It lists conditions of employment with St. Mark's. Once it has been agreed upon and approved by the Bishop, we will have an announcement on who will be our next Rector. The Vestry is hopeful that this will all be completed this month. Just a reminder that at this time we will then have a date on the

arrival of our Rector. I ask all of you for your prayers that St. Mark's is that place that our new Rector can grow our faith as well as that we can inspire growth in the Rector's faith. May we continue to grow God's community here at St. Mark's.

Deacon's Corner



After Easter Sunday itself, my all-time favorite Holy Week service at St. Mark's is the Seder Dinner with the Eucharist following as well as the foot washing ritual. I love it for two reasons. The first is because I love to cook and to eat in community. And the Seder Dinner is a perfect experience of this.

The second is because I also love the Maundy Thursday liturgy of the foot washing with its emphasis on servanthood. And unlike most churches, where this service is often very poorly attended, here at St. Mark's we have anywhere from 45-70 people every year. I think the Seder Dinner draws people,

and then they experience the footwashing and the power that it can have.

So I was glad once again to see how much joy and good feeling there was at our dinner this year. If you've never come to the Seder, try it next year. I know you'll not be disappointed.

Of course all the food was fabulous, with all the terrific cooks we have in our parish, but the Roasted Chicken with Clementines and Arak (we used Pernod) was the star. The recipe was requested by many, so here it is. Enjoy!

Roasted Chicken with Clementines and Arak Excerpt from *Jerusalem* by Yonan and Ottolenghi

Ingredients

- 6 tbsp. arak, ouzo, or Pernod
- 4 tbsp. olive oil
- 3 tbsp. freshly squeezed orange juice
- 3 tbsp. freshly squeezed lemon juice
- 2 tbsp. grain mustard
- 3 tbsp. light brown sugar
- 2 medium fennel bulbs (1 lb. in total)
- 1 large organic or free-range chicken, about 2 3/4 lb., divided into 8 pieces, or the same weight in skin-on, bone-in chicken thighs
- 4 clementines, unpeeled (14 oz. in total), cut horizontally into 1/4-in. slices
- 1 tbsp. thyme leaves
- 2 tsp. fennel seeds, lightly crushed
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- Chopped flat-leaf parsley, to garnish

Serves 4

Directions

Put the first six ingredients in a large mixing bowl and add 2 1/2 tsp. salt and 1 1/2 tsp. black pepper. Whisk well and set aside. Trim the fennel and cut each bulb in half lengthwise. Cut each half into 4 wedges. Add the fennel to the liquids, along with the chicken pieces, clementine slices, thyme, and fennel seeds. Stir well with your hands, then leave to marinate in the fridge for a few hours or overnight. (Skipping the marinating stage is also fine, if you are pressed for time.) Preheat the oven to 475°F / 220°C. Transfer the chicken and its marinade to a baking sheet large enough to accommodate everything comfortably in a single layer (roughly 12 by 14 1/2-inch). The chicken skin should be facing up. Once the oven is hot enough, put the pan in the oven and roast for 35 to 45 minutes, until the chicken is colored and cooked through. Remove from the oven. Lift the chicken, fennel, and clementines from the pan and arrange on a serving plate; cover and keep warm. Pour the cooking liquid into a small saucepan, place over medium-high heat, bring to a boil, and then simmer until the sauce is reduced by one-third, so you are left with about 1 cup. Pour the hot sauce over the chicken, garnish with some parsley, and serve.

Prayer is Alive and Well at St. Mark's Church



*“Rejoice always,

Many kinds of intercessory prayer happen at St. Mark's and in the homes of St. Mark's members. As you know, intercessory prayer is the act of praying for other people.

The first kind, which may be most familiar to you, is what occurs on Sunday mornings during the worship service and is known as the Prayers of the People. In Sunday worship, the congregation prays for the Presiding Bishop, our Bishop, those in our government; those celebrating birthdays or anniversaries; those who are ill, suffering difficulties, injustice, or persecution; and those who have died.

There are also the prayers prayed singly by the members of the Prayer Team. Team members pray daily for the Presiding Bishop, Bishop, and Rector; those who are homebound, ill, in the hospital, having surgery, experiencing difficult life situations; and those who are facing death or who have died. Besides me, those who pray these prayers are Virginia Chappell, Nerissa Eichinger, Barb Franczyk, Janet Martin, Ellie Moseley, David Platcow, Norm

Reynolds, Mary Ross, Skrauss, Sandi Tunis, Frank West, Mary Williams, and Steve Wolff.

On the third Sunday of every month, healing prayer is available in the chapel after the worship service and is given by Ron Tunis, Frank West, Deacon Michelle Mooney, or me. Anyone who wishes may receive individual, private prayer and anointing.

How may one request these different types of prayers for oneself, a relative, or friend?

For inclusion in the Prayers of the People in this time without a Rector, please call or email Sara Bitner, the Parish Administrator, at the church office or Deacon Michelle Mooney to request prayers. Be advised, though, that the need of those included in the Prayers of the People is expected to be acute. These names will usually be included in the Prayers of the People for three consecutive Sundays.

For prayer by members of the Prayer Team, please call or email Deacon Michelle or me. These prayers will be said until the need for prayer is over, so I always welcome updates to prayer needs. And don't forget that prayers of rejoicing are always appropriate! It's wonderful to be able to give thanks for an engagement, a wedding, a birth, or a new job.

For healing prayer on every third Sunday, no prior request is necessary. Simply go to the chapel and advise whoever is providing prayer of your particular need.

Outreach Ministry Spotlight: Central Asia Institute



As many of you know, for some years St. Mark's has been a supporter of the Central Asia Institute (CAI), whose administrative headquarters are in Montana but whose mission is carried out in remote mountain villages of Central Asia, particularly in Afghanistan, Pakistan, and Tajikistan. And what is that mission? *The CAI empowers communities located in these mountain villages of Central Asia through literacy and education (especially for girls), promotes peace through education, and conveys the importance of these activities globally.* Very few organizations serve the remote areas where CAI works.

Who are these people with whom CAI works? The people and cultures of Central Asia are as varied and diverse as the landscape, blending to create a

tapestry of customs, language and cultures that have flourished for thousands of years. The Islamic faith is the commonality among these people, emphasizing strong family units and community spirit.

The stated goal of educating girls was one of the earliest and primary projects of CAI. In the past, if there was a school, the boys attended, but the girls did not. But over time it became apparent that literacy was a primary need for all these people—boys, girls, and adults—so far removed from educational opportunities.

Perhaps a brief history of CAI would be helpful to understand the background and objectives of the organization. The Central Asia Institute is a registered 501(c)3 nonprofit organization, founded in 1996. Greg Mortenson, co-founder of CAI, began his work in northern Pakistan in 1993. Initial funds to establish CAI were provided by Dr. Jean Hoerni, a Swiss physician and Silicon Valley microchip-industry pioneer. Mortenson himself had lived overseas for many years, growing up on the slopes of Mt. Kilimanjaro, Tanzania. But it was the Balti people he met after climbing K2 (world's second highest mountain) in 1993 that inspired his humanitarian efforts.

Mortenson's work was catalyzed when Dr. Hoerni provided funding for the first two projects—a bridge over the Braldu River and a school in

Korphe village. Mortenson worked with the people of the Karakoram mountains in northern Pakistan for three years—a region relatively unknown to outsiders. The tribal communities of Northern Pakistan taught Mortenson a critical lesson in the early years:

“Sustainable and successful development can only occur when projects are entirely initiated, implemented and managed by local communities. Empowerment of the local people through their own initiative is at the heart of all CAI programs.”

Let's jump ahead. Following the work with the Balti community, CAI has worked in many remote areas in the mountains of central Asia to build schools with and for local communities (and local can mean a very broad swath of territory) throughout this rugged area. Those schools are for both boys and girls and include women's vocational centers as well.

Reading the CAI publications and looking at maps of the areas in which they have worked and built schools is an amazing and exciting story.

While we in the U.S. heard mainly of the war in Afghanistan and adjacent countries, in the

most remote mountain areas, schools were being built and students were being educated—for both boys and girls, and in some cases, mothers and fathers. A foundation for peace was being built slowly but surely.

Central Asia is a vast and mountainous area, and programs like this are essential to maintain peace and understanding

in a changing world. So the work goes on, and it needs support from outside sources; hence the appeals from the Central Asia Institute and our response with Outreach funds.

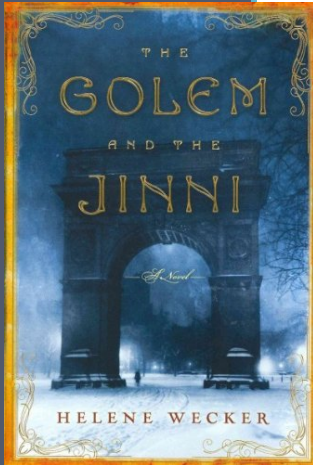

Common Ground at St. Mark's



The Spring Delegate Assembly of Common Ground titled “Coming Into Focus” was held at Mt. Mary University on Wednesday, April 29, from 7–8:30 p.m. Over 230 delegates from 55 member groups attended. Attendees from St. Mark’s were Jackie Adams, Molly Canary, Virginia Chappell, Andy Martin, Janet Martin, Michelle Mooney, Ellie Moseley, Harry Moseley, Jennifer O’Hear, and Judy Young.

The meeting’s focus was to bring members and interested guests up to date with our current campaigns. There were also presentations about new initiatives in Common Ground. But most importantly, there was information on how you can get involved in one of these issues if it is your passion.

Jennifer O’Hear of St. Mark’s gave one of the main presentations of the evening. It was a resolution with five elements, which was overwhelmingly approved.

1. We will continue to work on new ways to fund Fair Play playgrounds.
2. We will press our case before the Milwaukee Common Council at hearings, public actions, and a “cyber” campaign to have council members vote NO to any public money for a new Bucks arena.
3. We will send CG leaders to the May 14 Nationstar shareholders meeting in Dallas TX to ask Nationstar to give \$30 million to the City of Milwaukee to deal with foreclosed properties in our City.
4. We will send CG leaders to NYC on June 25th for the NBA draft to send the message that the NBA needs to Stop Extorting Public

Money from local communities to build their new arenas.

5. We will conduct an educational seminar for CG leaders to learn how we can be engaged in a non-partisan way in the spring of 2016 local Milwaukee elections for Mayor and Common Council.

After the voting and approval of the proposal, members were able to go to various centers where Common Ground leaders gave presentations of present and future issues such as Core Team Development, Fair Play, Don’t Stand Idly By (an anti-gun violence program), SPAN/neighborhood organizing, Workforce Transportation, the Common Ground Healthcare Coop, and a new project for clean water and efficient water usage called Watershed.

All attendees were able to go to two different centers and hear about the work being done on both established issues and new ones that they might want to become involved in.

The meeting ended by all members being asked to fill out commitment forms to indicate which area(s) of CG they would like to work in. For we have learned, it is not enough to just be in favor or opposed to a particular issue or example of injustice. We must act together and build power to see these problems solved.

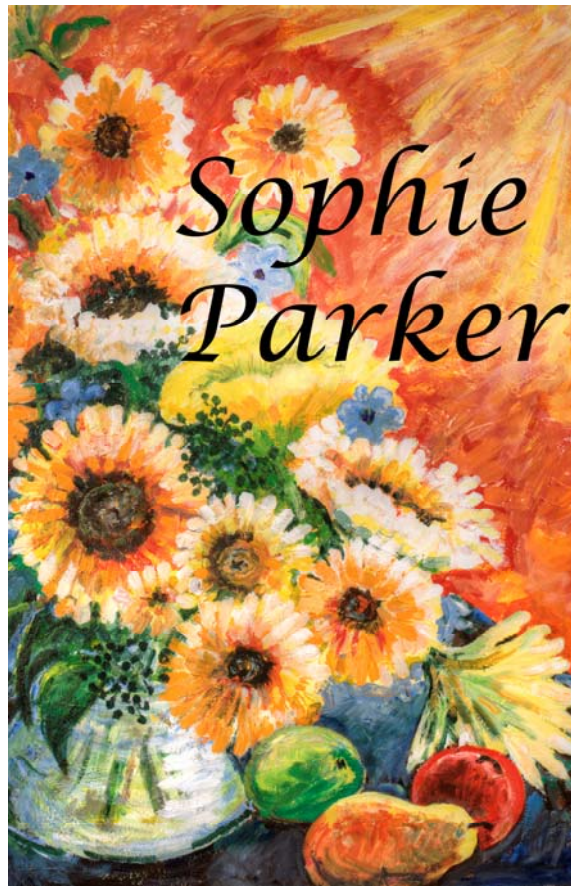
