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Warden's Corner


Dear Friends,

September Update on Rector Search



We are moving forward quickly. For the Search Committee, early September will be a time of phone interviews with some excellent, exciting candidates. After the interviews, we will be planning a series of late September, early October trips to candidates' home parishes. On these trips, two members of the committee will visit a service to hear the candidate preach in person. The visitors will also have conversations with various members of that parish's leadership as appropriate.

By the October 20 Vestry meeting, we hope to be recommending to the Vestry two finalists to invite for a visit to St. Mark's, when they will have face-to-face interviews with the Vestry and staff members. Although we hope and pray that we will have a Rector under contract by Thanksgiving, or by early December, we do not expect to ask that person to leave his or her home parish until after Christmas. So far, it remains reasonable to ask the new Rector to arrive sometime in January or, definitely, God willing, by Ash Wednesday on February 10, 2016. Please remember that moving a household can be a major, time-consuming undertaking. We are not making any promises beyond the assurance that we will continue to move forward carefully, prayerfully.

The committee and Vestry ask that you keep us in your prayers along with the candidates who have expressed their interest in leading us in ministry.

Common Ground at St. Mark's

Common Ground continues its campaign to convince the citizens of Milwaukee and their elected officials to say no to public funding of the proposed Bucks arena. Recognizing that it will be virtually impossible for the City of Milwaukee alderpersons to vote against the plan, Common Ground has instead focused on trying to get Wes Edens, principal Bucks and Nationstar owner, to contribute money for the rehabbing of foreclosed properties in the central city.

Since Nationstar is a large owner and servicer of inner city foreclosed properties that have been left in disrepair, it is fitting, CG argues, that they should take some responsibility in helping to return these blighted houses into homes fit for owner occupants.

On Tuesday, August 18, CG held an action at one of the Nationstar homes that since January of this year has had two fires, squatters, and a dead animal

hanging from the second floor gutters. It is a scourge on the homes of families that live nearby. With print and media representatives looking on, CG volunteers filled large shipping boxes with trash, broken bottles, and assorted debris to send to the office of Wes Edens in New York City.

Further actions, meetings with city alderpersons, and other public officials continue to be planned until the vote on funding is taken in late September. Hopefully, the City of Milwaukee will negotiate money from Nationstar for the funding of central city housing rehabilitation as his gift to a city that is gifting his Bucks team so generously. It only seems fair, right?

Cheddar/Bacon Scones

A note from Mary Bellis Williams: A number of people said they loved the cheddar/bacon scones [at the tea on July 12], and they ate dozens and dozens of them. Just in case anybody wants to make them, here's the recipe:

3 cups all-purpose flour (I used about half whole wheat flour)
1 Tbsp. baking powder
1 tsp. salt
1 Tbsp. freshly ground black pepper
1 stick chilled unsalted butter, cut into small cubes
1 1/2 cups grated cheddar cheese
4 green onions, thinly sliced
10 slices bacon, cooked and chopped into 1 inch pieces
3/4 to 1 1/2 cups buttermilk or heavy cream
1 large egg
2 tsp. water

Preheat oven to 400 degrees.

Using a mixer fitted with a paddle attachment, combine flour, baking powder, salt, and black pepper in large bowl on low speed. With mixer running, gradually add cubes of butter until the mixture is crumbly and stuffed with flour—the butter bits should be about the size of small peas. (Note: I used a wire pastry blender to cut up the butter in the flour mix and it worked just fine). Add grated cheese and mix until just blended.

Add green onions, bacon, and 3/4 cup of the buttermilk/cream to the flour and cheese mixture. Mix by hand just until all ingredients are incorporated. If dough is too dry to hold together, use remaining buttermilk, adding 1 Tbsp. at a time until dough is pliable and can be formed into a ball. Stir as lightly and as little as possible to ensure a lighter-textured scone. Remove dough from bowl and place on a lightly floured flat surface. Pat dough into a circle about 8 inches wide and 1/2 inch thick (I found that it worked better making two circles because I got smaller scones that way). Cut dough into 8 to 10 equal wedges, depending on the scone size you prefer.


Whisk egg and water in a small mixing bowl to combine. Brush each wedge with egg wash. Place scones on a parchment-lined baking sheet and bake for 18–20 minutes until golden brown. Serve warm.



News from General Convention: A New Presiding Bishop, Same-Sex Marriage Rites, and More

Editor's Note: The following is Senior Warden Frank West's report from a July diocesan meeting at which Bishop Miller and lay and clergy delegates from the Diocese of Milwaukee discussed their experiences at the 2015 triennial General Convention of the Episcopal Church.

Election of the New Presiding Bishop



The Rt. Rev. Michael Curry, Bishop of North Carolina, was elected on the first ballot, receiving more than twice as many votes as the other candidates. He is the church's first African American presiding bishop. Our diocesan deputies noted that this may have been the first presiding bishop elected on the first ballot.

The Seabury Western alumnus was a very popular bishop in North Carolina and is a lifelong Episcopalian. He will be installed on All Saints' Day, Sunday, November 1.

Same-Sex Marriage Rites

Leading up to the convention, a special committee examined eighteen resolutions concerning rites for same-sex marriages. Noting that many resolutions were very similar, the committee combined them and reduced the total number to three. The Diocese of Milwaukee deputies noted that the resolutions honor



all voices and Episcopal theology, respect church bylaws, and clean up things left undone in our current marriage rite canons. The resolutions guide individuals by emphasizing Episcopalian rules and focusing on existing marriage rite canons.

The following three resolutions passed:

Resolution 1 allows the 2012 Blessing Rite to continue to be used and adds a trial same-sex marriage rite.

Resolution 2 revises the Blessing Rite to make it similar to the Marriage Rite and calls for the Book of Common Prayer (1979) to be revised to eliminate gender specific language during same-sex marriage ceremonies.

Resolution 3 changes the Marriage Canon so that, beginning the first Sunday of Advent (November 29, 2015), the trial sex-same marriage rites can be used, as long as the bishop of the local diocese approves. Bishop Miller will approve as long as the parish chooses to have the rite.

The same-sex rite will be available only in dioceses where bishops have allowed it to be performed.

Disability Resolution

The Very Rev. Anna Doherty sponsored a resolution to establish a policy for short term disability. This policy makes the Church Pension Group and the parental leave policy available to clergy and lay people including fathers and adoptive parents. The church pension committee will develop a plan to

communicate to all the dioceses that Church Pension Insurance covers the cost of pregnancy Family Leave.

Resolution 158: Alcohol in the Episcopal Church

In response to an automobile accident that involved a clergy person and resulted in a fatality, the issue of alcohol use in the Episcopal Church was discussed at length. The convention considered the use and serving of alcohol at church functions. Resolution A158 includes guidelines for serving alcohol at parish events and urges that nonalcoholic beverages always be available, including at Communion.

Restructuring Report

It was decided that it would be most efficient for the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies to work in joint sessions for similar non-controversial issues.

Digital Evangelism

A pilot project has been developed to work on planting churches and increasing the use of digital evangelism with a focus on using social media. Both houses approved a

\$5 million budget with one million specifically for evangelism and digital evangelism.

National Assessments

National diocesan assessments will be decreasing annually. This next year, dioceses will be assessed at 18%, the following year the rate will be 16.5%, and the following year the assessment will be 15%. This is the portion that the diocese sends in from parish payments to the Diocese of Milwaukee.

Martha Berger—Assistant Secretary of the Dispatch-Business Report

Rev. Berger watches as all legislation moves through the houses to ensure efficiency. It was noted that all of the committed business and voting was done ahead of schedule. For the first time, all business was documented using iPads.

Deputy Report on the Rules of Order

The Rules of Order for the convention had been rewritten for this convention. They had not been altered for the last 15 conventions.

Bishop Miller and our deputies who went to General Convention stated how everyone worked long days and very hard to do convention work. They had a strong sense that the Holy Spirit was with the convention and were very excited with all that was accomplished.

Art Gallery

Artist's Statement: Bridget Lyle Wolf

When I was a little girl my dad explained "You're lucky, you know what you're going to be when you grow up. Artists just know."

He was right. A pencil in my hand always provides a sketch, a design or a bright idea. I've explored ceramics, fibers, clay, metals, yet I always come back to painting.

For me, painting wraps its arms around the place and the light.

I paint with my husband, Dan. That way I can always borrow some of his perfect, sky violet!



Artist's Statement: Daniel Stauff

Dan's artistic vocabulary originated within the realm of large, abstract paintings in oils as well as multimedia constructions. With a core of study in figure drawing, sculpture, and oil painting, he moved into several different areas of study. These ranged from small and very detailed paintings of birds, to large street murals. Dan founded and ran the Flesh Experts figure drawing group in Milwaukee for 15 years. This was a focused group study of the figure with comparative criticism and concluded with a show and sale.

In the summer of 1984, Dan focused on plein air painting in watercolor and then oil paints. He continued this focus through 2001, after which he returned to a concentration on realism in the studio. It led to portraits of people and animals, landscapes and interpretive cityscapes. He started to photograph and then paint from those photographs. This emphasis on realism began to also take on an impressionistic feel.



In 2003 Dan began working on a series of paintings done from historical black and white photographs from Europe. These have expanded the study to the Milwaukee River as it existed as a port from the 1880s to the present. Preserved maritime photographs are used to inspire and fulfill a desire to experience Milwaukee's maritime history. Within this theme of reliving the city's and country's past, the love of Native Americans has presented itself as another major theme. Similarly, this awakening is from old photographs and postcards, books, and hand-me-down stories and legends.

Dan expresses, "For me, painting is an ever present desire, and I continue to explore different techniques and subject matter. I continue to explore plein air painting throughout the United States, the Americas, and Europe, but now with a nod to their histories."
